Ordinary Time

After all of the excitement of the holiday season that began at Thanksgiving and continued through Advent and into Christmas and New Year, we have finally settled down a bit. We can rest for a while and gather our collective breaths as we enter briefly into the liturgical season of Ordinary Time.

The term "Ordinary" in the liturgical sense doesn't mean what we might think; as in mundane, plain, or normal. In the liturgical sense Ordinary Time derives its name from the word *ordinal*, or, *ordered*; think of things that are numbered or numbered. Yet despite this, I admit that I often do think of Ordinary Time as that "normal" time in the life of the Church. I often think of it as merely the time between the big moments in the Church like Advent, Christmas, Lent, and Easter; the in-between time that seems so, well, *ordinary*. Yet however ordinary this time may feel, it is important to recognize and remember that this time is indeed blessed and sacred.

But isn't this just like life? Isn't there something sacred in the ordinary? If we pay attention hopefully we can recognize that there is something holy that is hidden in the common, mundane, and everyday activities that take up most of our lives as well. There is something beautiful and sacred in that ordinary time and space that separates the extraordinary moments in life. There is something beautiful in the day-to-day, in the routine. If we look hard enough we might recognize the miracles and the presence of God in the moments that fill the ordinary.

As we dip into Ordinary Time for a bit until we reach Lent, my prayer for us is that we can appreciate and give thanks to God for the often overlooked and seemingly mundane miracles that we experience every day; in the ordinary.



Saint of the week



"I am the bread of life." John 6:51

Upon the completion of the Presentation and Preparation of the Gifts (bread and wine), the Priest invites us to prayer by beginning: *Pray brethren that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father.* We respond: *May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands, for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.* Next, the Priest says a prayer over the gifts of bread and wine, addressed to almighty God, and always concluding with, through Christ our Lord, and we respond, *Amen.* Mass continues with what is called the Preface Dialogue, between the Priest and the congregation. We hear the Priest begin. *The Lord be with you,* and we respond, *and with your spirit.* The priest continues, *lift up your hearts* and we respond, *we lift them up to the Lord.* The priest concludes, *let us give thanks to the Lord our God,* and we respond, *it is right and just.* The Priest continues the Liturgy of the Eucharist by praying what is called the Preface. The Preface is an introductory prayer which leads us into the most holy and solemn part of the Liturgy of the Eucharist, which is the Eucharistic Prayer. The Preface concludes with our choir or cantor leading us in the Sanctus (Latin for Holy). This can also be recited by the congregation. *Holy, Holy, Holy Lord, God of Power and Might. Heaven and Earth are full of Your Glory, Hosanna in the Highest. Blessed is He Who comes in the name of the Lord, Hosanna in the Highest.* These words are taken from Isaiah 6:3 and Revelation 4:8 as well as Mark 11:9-10. Next week we will continue to move forward with the Eucharistic Prayer.

In today's Gospel we learn about one of at least two family relations that appear among Jesus' first disciples. Andrew is the brother of Simon, whom Jesus re-names Peter. In next week's Gospel, we will learn about the brothers James and John, the sons of Zebedee. We know from the letters of Paul and other witnesses to the early Church that it was a common occurrence for an entire household to be baptized together. From the very beginning of the Church, families helped one another to know and follow Jesus. We hope and pray that this continues to be true in our family life.



